

Khurram Hussain is an Associate Professor in the Department of Religion Studies at Lehigh University. He holds an A.B in Religion and Physics from Bowdoin College and a PhD. in Religious Studies from Yale University, with extensive training in comparative ethics, historical sociology, and modern Western philosophy. His first monograph, *Islam as Critique: Sayyid Ahmad Khan and the Challenge of Modernity*, is an exploration of the work of 19th century Indian Muslim reformer Sayyid Ahmad Khan in a comparative perspective with Western thinkers like Reinhold Niebuhr, Hannah Arendt and Alasdair MacIntyre. His second forthcoming book, *The Muslim Questions (or Can the Muslim Speak?)*, offers a detailed examination of the tropes and discourses surrounding the category of *Islam* in modern Western public spheres.
